GENERAL RULES AND REGULATION

Administration of Rules and Regulations:

The Amarillo Tri-State Exposition reserves to its Executive Board the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or connected with or incidental to the Fair, and the right to amend or add to these rules as its judgment may determine. An exhibitor who violates any of the following rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalties as the Executive Board may order.

Special rules or conditions are published in each department where necessary. If there is a conflict between the special rules of any department and the general rules and regulations, the special rules will govern.

Statement of Liability

RULE 1: All **exhibitors** will be under the control and direction of the Management, but the Amarillo Tri-State Exposition will in no case be responsible for any loss or injury or damage that may occur. Each exhibitor and/or owner will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage to, or occasioned by, or arising from, any animal or article exhibited by the owner or exhibitor. **THE EXHIBITOR AND/OR OWNER INDEMNIFY THE AMARILLO TRI-STATE EXPOSITION AGAINST ALL LEGAL OR OTHER PROCEEDINGS IN REGARD THERETO, AS WELL AS DAMAGE OR INJURY TO ANY PERSON OR PROPERTY, CAUSED BY THE ANIMAL OR ARTICLE EXHIBITED EVEN IF THE INCIDENT IS CAUSED BY, OR ALLEGED TO HAVE BEEN CAUSED BY, IN WHOLE OR IN PART THE NEGLIGENCE OR GROSS NEGLIGENCE OF AMARILLO TRI-STATE EXPOSITION.** The Amarillo Tri-State Exposition will not be responsible for any loss or damage resulting from or caused by strikes, riots, lockout or acts of God.

Relationship of Exposition and Exhibitors

RULE 2: By entering any competition, an exhibitor or entrant is deemed to have agreed to all rules governing Amarillo Tri-State Exposition competitions generally, as well as the rules governing the particular competition in question. To the extent that an entry fee is charged, the exhibitor or entrant agrees that any such fee is paid solely for the purpose of helping defray the costs and expenses of the Amarillo Tri-State Exposition, a non-profit organization, a portion of which costs and expenses are incurred in conducting the competition in question. **THE EXHIBITOR OR ENTRANT UNDERSTAND AND AGREE THAT THE AMARILLO TRI-STATE EXPOSITION SPONSORS SUCH COMPETITIONS SOLELY FOR THE EDUCATIONAL AND ELEEMOSYNARY PURPOSES OF THE AMARILLO TRI-STATE EXPOSITION, AND THAT, BY ENTERING A COMPETITION, THE ENTRANT OR EXHIBITOR IS IN NO WAY PURCHASING OR EXPECTING TO OBTAIN OR PAY FOR ANY GOODS OR SERVICES. THE EXHIBITOR OR ENTRANT FURTHER AGREES THAT, TO THE EXTENT ANY TESTING OR ANALYSIS MAY BE UNDERTAKEN BY THE EXPOSITION WITH RESPECT TO AN ANIMAL, FOOD, PRODUCT OR COMMODITY ENTERED FOR ANY CONTEST, SUCH TESTING IS DONE PURELY FOR THE USE OF THE AMARILLO TRI-STATE EXPOSITION AND IS NOT PROVIDED TO THE ENTRANT OR EXHIBITOR AS A GOOD OR SERVICE; AND EXHIBITOR OR ENTRANT AGREE THAT, IF EXHIBITOR OR ENTRANT WISH TO OBTAIN ANY TESTING OR ANALYSIS, HE/SHE OR IT MAY DO SO AT THEIR OWN EXPENSE. EXHIBITORS AND ENTRANTS ARE HEREBY ADVISED THAT ANY TESTING AND ANALYSIS DONE BY TRI-STATE EXPOSITION IS DONE BY OUTSIDE THIRD-PARTY PROVIDERS. THE AMARILLO TRI-STATE EXPOSITION MAKES NO WARRANTY AS TO THE ACCURACY OF ANY TESTS OR ANALYSIS SO PROVIDED.**

Entry Information

RULE 3: Competition is open to the world unless otherwise stated in the special rules governing a particular department.

RULE 4: To be eligible for entry, exhibitors and their exhibits must meet and adhere to the requirements of Special Rules listed under the appropriate department or departments (in subsequent pages of the premium list).

RULE 5: All applications for entry must be made out on printed forms and in accordance with instructions on form. Entry forms (Unless otherwise specified in respective area) may be obtained free from the Tri-State Fair office.

RULE 6: ENTRY FEES ARE NON-RETURNABLE AND REFUNDS WILL NOT BE MADE.

RULE 7: In all cases the Management reserves the right to reject entirely or accept conditionally any entry of application and does not guarantee space in exhibit buildings.

RULE 8: Each exhibitor (and exhibitor's parent or legal guardian--if exhibitor is a minor) must sign a statement acknowledging that he/she understand and will abide by the liability requirements and rules and regulations of the Tri-State Fair & Rodeo. **If the exhibitor does not sign this statement (contained on the back of summary card or entry form), his/her application for entry will not be accepted.**

RULE 9: Exhibits that have been erroneously entered may be transferred to their proper class, prior to judging, upon application to the division superintendent. If such classes have been judged, however, they shall not be reopened. Any exhibit falsely entered or disqualified, shall be removed from the grounds and all entry fees will be forfeited.

RULE 10: To be accepted, applications for entry must be accompanied by the correct entry fee or fees.

RULE 11: ENTRY DEADLINE. Exhibitors must pay strict attention to entry deadline dates. Entries must be postmarked (canceled) by the U.S. Postal Service, Canadian or International Postal Service no later than the applicable deadline date.

RULE 12: Each exhibitor must provide his/her Social Security number or tax identification number as required by law on all entry forms. If the proper number is not provided, application for entry will not be accepted.

Taxes: Effective Jan. 1, 1984, federal law requires the withholding of 20 percent Federal Income Tax from payments made to vendors for which we do not have a taxpayer identification number. This withholding requirement was included in the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982, and generally applies to payments which are required to be reported on Form 1099 to Internal Revenue Service.

RULE 13: Management reserves the right to remove from the grounds or any sponsored Fair activity, any exhibit, entry, animal, stand or show they deem unsuitable, objectionable, or in rule violation and to return any money already paid for space or stalls. Management will not be required to furnish reasons for such actions; the return of the exhibitor's money (if any) exonerates the Fair from any claims by the exhibitor, participant or purchaser.

RULE 14: Exhibitors not cooperating with security personnel or Officials of the Fair in all matters of policy, including parking will have their entries canceled and will be ordered to remove their exhibit from the grounds immediately. **You must have a Parking Permit on your windshield to enter Gates 2 or 3.** Free parking at Gates 1, 4 & 5.

RULE 15: Fair management reserves the right to combine, split or cancel classes at its discretion in all departments of the Tri-State Fair & Rodeo.

RULE 16: Late entries. Open Cattle Late Entries will be accepted until noon the day before the show date at \$25 per entry in addition to the entry fee. **Youth Late Entries** will be \$25 per entry, in addition to the entry fee. **Absolutely no youth entries after Sept. 1, 2009.**

RULE 17: Incomplete entry card/cards fine is \$10. This fine has to be paid or you won't be allowed to show.

Judges and Judging Procedure

RULE 18: Judges are requested to be familiar with all rules, regulations and procedures of the Tri-State Fair & Rodeo.

RULE 19: Procedures of selecting judges and of determining judging systems rest solely with the management.

RULE 20: The decision of the judges will be final in all cases, except where mistake, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion is discovered after awards are given. In such cases, the show management or such referee as it may appoint may make the

final decision. Such cases may be sent to the Executive Board from whose decision there can be no appeal.

RULE 21: If any exhibitor or his representative interferes with the judges or shows disrespect to them, or the Fair, the management may withhold from the exhibitor any premiums that may have been awarded or take any other steps deemed desirable.

RULE 22: Judges may award a prize of such grade as any exhibit deserves where there are fewer entries in a class than the number of premiums offered.

RULE 23: If an exhibit is disqualified after winning awards, the exhibit placing below it may be moved up (at the option of the judge) to fill the vacated position.

Premiums

RULE 24: The Executive Board reserves the right to pay printed premiums in relation to net earnings. Since premiums and all other expenses must be paid from receipts from the operation of the Exposition, this condition is made to put all exhibitors on due and legal notice.

RULE 25: Premiums (in specified departments) may be picked up at times listed in the premium catalog. Premiums not picked up and all others will be forwarded to exhibitors after close of show as they can properly be processed. All premiums not claimed within 90 days upon receipt shall be deemed forfeited to the management of donors. Premiums under \$1 will not be mailed. **Premiums will be mailed out by Nov. 5, 2009.**

RULE 26: The Tri-State Fair and Rodeo will not be responsible for lost or misplaced vouchers. Premium Vouchers will be cashed daily in the specified building with the times for cashing posted each day. Vouchers not redeemed during the fair can be mailed to the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo and a check will be issued to the exhibitor. All vouchers must be redeemed by Oct. 31, 2009. If redeemed by mail, mailing address and a self-addressed stamped envelope must be included.

Other Rules and Regulations

RULE 27: Dogs will not be permitted on the Tri-State Fairgrounds. **Exception:** Seeing-Eye and Hearing-Aid dogs and stock dogs entered in competition. All dogs must be on a leash.

RULE 28: No person will be permitted to distribute advertising matter upon the grounds or parade route, except from his place of business or exhibit space. The tacking or posting of any advertisements, bills, etc., other than within the space occupied

by exhibits, is strictly prohibited. The distribution of handbills, fliers and heralds will not, under any circumstance, be permitted.

RULE 29: Any article or animal in an exhibition may not be removed from the grounds prior to its release time without written permission by the department superintendent or Fair management. Any violation of this rule will cause forfeiture of all premiums earned by exhibitor.

RULE 30: Any equipment brought on the grounds to be used in exhibitor's stall or space must comply with and be used in compliance with all Federal, State and Municipal occupational safety and health regulations.

RULE 31: Nothing shall be sold or given away or otherwise disposed of by exhibitors which will in any way conflict with, or which is subject matter of, any privilege or concession granted or sold by the Tri-State Fair & Rodeo.

Protests

RULE 32: All protests must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$25 in cash, which will be forfeited if the protest is not upheld. Such protest must state the cause for the protest and must be delivered to the Management immediately after the occasion for the protest. Any protest as to the eligibility of an animal must be filed at least 12 hours prior to the time that the animal is to be judged. Only exhibitors in the department, parents, guardians of the exhibitor in the department, AgriLife Extension agents and FFA instructors who have members with exhibits in this department, the superintendent of the department and the manager of the Amarillo Tri-State Exposition, may file a protest. Any protest filed will be referred to the manager of the Amarillo Tri-State Exposition for handling.

FIRST AID INFORMATION

FIRST AID STATION: The Tri-State Fair and Rodeo will maintain an equipped First-Aid Station, staffed by registered nurses and aides, to provide emergency treatment and reference facilities for accidents and illnesses occurring on the Tri-State Fairgrounds.

TEXAS ANIMAL HEALTH COMMISSION
REGULATION SUMMARY
Revised as of June 3, 2009

The Tri-State Fair and Rodeo is an interstate show which accepts entries of livestock, horses and poultry from within Texas and other states for all open shows. Youth shows are intrastate shows for market lambs, market steers, market goats and market swine; interstate for beef heifers, dairy goats and Boer goats.

Certificates of Veterinary Inspection are required for out-of-state entries.

1. Certificates are valid for (45) days for horses and other equine being exhibited, or exhibited and sold.
2. For other livestock, the certificates are in effect for (30) days for exhibit, or exhibit and sale.

Prior Entry Permits are required as noted for specific classes of livestock. Permits may be obtained by calling (512) 719-0777 (24 hours) or (800) 550-8242, or writing the Texas Animal Health Commission, 2105 Kramer Lane, Box 12966, Austin, Texas 78711-2966.

NOTE: These regulations, as written, are a condensed version of the Texas Animal Health Commission regulations. Specific T.A.H.C. regulations will supersede the condensed Tri-State Fair and Rodeo version if there is a dispute between the two.
--

ROUTINE INSPECTION PROCEDURES
(WHAT THE INSPECTORS SHOULD DO)

1. Inspectors should meet the incoming livestock vehicle at the entry gate to the livestock staging areas.
2. All documents are to be examined and a visual inspection of the shipment is to be made. Be certain that certificates of veterinary inspection, EIA test information permits, etc. are still valid. A visual exam of the animals is to be made to ensure that the animals described on the documents are the same as those in the shipment.
3. If shipments meet all entry requirements, allow the driver to proceed without delay. Return the certificates and other documents to the owner or driver.

4. If a shipment does not meet the requirements, the driver should pull the truck or trailer aside out of traffic. Contact security if problems occur. If animals must be unloaded, they must remain in a separate pen (holding area) away from other livestock. Individuals should be allowed to contact the show veterinarian or their own veterinarian to obtain the proper documents and/or tests. Documentation must be in writing – no corrections will be allowed by phone. Faxed documents are permissible.
5. Consult the show veterinarian if animals do not appear to be in good health when inspections are made.

CATTLE (Beef)

1. Current certificate of veterinary inspection (30 days)
2. Breeding stock (18 months or Older) offered for sale- Negative Brucellosis test (30 days) or originate from a certified free herd.

Out-of-State Origin

1. Current certificate of veterinary inspection (30 days)
2. Breeding stock (18 months or Older) offered for sale- Negative Brucellosis test (30 days) or originate from a certified free herd

MARKET STEERS--Intrastate Show

1. Nothing is required.

MARKET LAMBS--Intrastate Show

1. Nothing is required

MARKET SWINE

Texas Origin

1. Nothing is required

Out-of-State Origin

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days listing identification and including statements that they have not been fed garbage, have not been exposed to hog cholera or pseudorabies, and have not been vaccinated for pseudorabies.

YOUTH MARKET GOATS

1. Nothing is required.

GOATS

Texas-Origin Goats & Out-of-State-Origin Goats

1. Current certificate of veterinary inspection (30 days)
2. All sexually intact exhibition goats must be officially identified with a USDA Scrapie Eradication Program eartag, except registered goats with a registration tattoo and accompanied by registration papers.

HORSES: MULES, DONKEYS (ALL OTHER EQUINE)

Texas Origin & Out – of –State

1. Current Coggins (12 months)

POULTRY

Texas Origin

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days.

2. Negative pullorum-Typhoid test within 30 (thirty) days or from flocks that meet either the Texas Pullorum-Typhoid Program or the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP)
3. Domestic poultry must originate from a flock that is certified as Avian Influenza clean or from an Avian Influenza negative flock or tested according to TAHC requirements within 30 days of entry.
4. Certification on Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that Laryngotracheitis has not been active in the area of origin in the past 30 days.
5. Vaccination must be vaccines approved by USDA and TAHC. (Contact TAHC for a list of approved vaccines.)
NOTE: No modified live virus chick embryo origin Laryngotracheitis (LT) vaccine and no modified live virus mycoplasma gallisepticum (MG) attenuated vaccine may be used on poultry entering the state.

Out-of-State Origin

- 1 Must meet the same requirements as Texas Origin Poultry.
- 2 Prior entry permit issued by TAHC within 15 (fifteen) days.

RABBITS

All rabbits entering the Tri-State Fairgrounds must be checked by the show superintendent or agent(s) upon arrival to the grounds. Cooping will not be permitted until rabbits are checked. Decision of show superintendent is final.

DOGS

All dogs entering the Tri-State Fairgrounds must be accompanied by a current (within 30 days) certificate of veterinary inspection which states that the dog has been rabies vaccinated within (1) year of the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo competition dates.

FOREIGN SUBSTANCE PREVENTION AND RESIDUE AVOIDANCE PROGRAM

It is the policy of the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo to prevent the usage of illegal, unapproved or unethical drugs; growth stimulates or hormones; or any improper foreign substance in animals entered for exhibit at the Fair. The Fair reserves the right to limit or exclude the benefits of participation by any exhibitor determined by the Fair to be in violation of this policy. Without limiting the generality of the above, the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo sets out the following rules and guidelines for exhibitors.

1. Unapproved foreign substances shall be deemed to include, without limitation, any diuretic, growth stimulants or medication which is not approved by the Food and Drug Administration and/or the U.S. Department of Agriculture for slaughter animals, whether such substance is a commercial product or "homemade". If any substance has been administered by a licensed veterinarian that might cause problems with the foreign substance prevention policy, a written statement from the veterinarian giving the substance must be submitted to the Tri-State Fair office providing information on the substance given and the reason for administration. This statement must be presented to the division superintendent prior to the showing of any entry.
2. Tri-State Fair and Rodeo reserves the right to test any exhibition animal at its discretion. Testing may be performed by Tri-State Fair and Rodeo officials or its delegates, with or without the knowledge of the entrant. Testing may be performed on both a live animal and any carcass. Further, Tri-State Fair and Rodeo reserves the right to perform a post-mortem examination of any animal which dies at the Tri-State Fair. If a post-mortem examination is ordered by the Fair, the expense of the post-mortem is to be born by the exhibitor. By entering an animal to show at the Fair, the exhibitor is deemed to have consented to this rule and all testing procedures conducted by Tri-State Fair and Rodeo. The Tri-State Fair and Rodeo will pay for the first test. If protested, then the exhibitor will pay for the second test.
3. Tri-State Fair testing procedures shall be administered as a "zero tolerance" policy; in other words, test samples must be entirely free of unapproved foreign substances.

4. The Tri-State Fair and Rodeo expects to delegate its sample collection, testing procedures and laboratory analysis procedures to reasonably qualified individuals, veterinarians and technicians. The conclusions reached by such persons, as to whether an animal has been administered an unapproved foreign substance, including, without limitation, diuretics, unapproved growth stimulants or other unapproved medications shall be final. By entering animals in the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo, exhibitors agree that such conclusions are final and waive any recourse against the persons conducting any test or analysis, and waive recourse against Tri-State Fair and Rodeo or any of its officers or directors.
Further, exhibitors agree that any testing procedures provided by Tri-State Fair and Rodeo or conducted by Tri-State Fair and Rodeo are purely for its own purposes in order to administer the contests in question; and that exhibitors have not purchased or acquired, by virtue of their entry, any testing or analysis services; and exhibitors further agree that if they wish to obtain any test or analysis, they may obtain such additional tests or analysis at their own expense.
5. As a condition of participation in the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo, each animal exhibitor must submit to Fair management a **CERTIFICATION STATEMENT** that unapproved foreign substances have not been used. These forms must be signed by the exhibitor, the parent/legal guardian of the exhibitor and the AgriLife Extension agent or the school agricultural science teacher. No animal will be allowed to participate in the Fair until this form has been fully signed and submitted to Fair management.
6. The Tri-State Fair and Rodeo reserves the right to adopt, in its discretion and on a case-by-case basis, if it so desires, appropriate sanctions for any violation of these rules. At minimum, any animal testing positive for an unapproved foreign substance will be disqualified and declared ineligible to receive awards, premium money or sales proceeds. Further, the Fair may declare the exhibitor ineligible for further participation in the current Tri-State Fair and Rodeo in which he or she is entered with other animals and in any or all future Tri-State Fairs. In addition, the Fair may declare the same or greater ineligibility for members of the exhibitor's immediate family. Further, if the Fair has reasonable cause to believe that such violation was sanctioned, approved or aided by a sponsor, the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo may declare the sponsor ineligible for future participation.

7. If an entry is disqualified under this rule, no changes will be made in the placing of other animals.
8. By entering the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo, the exhibitor agrees that the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo may exchange information about the exhibitor with other shows and, further, may disclose, communicate or publish the results of any tests to officials of other exhibitions, to sponsoring county organizations of schools, to law enforcement officials and the press.

1. **OWNERSHIP:** All animals must be entered in the name of the owner(s) as shown on the Registration Certificate. All parties in a multiple ownership must be on the entry card. Firms and partnerships must be in existence at the time of making entry. Custom fitters must be listed on the entry card in the appropriate space. For ownership of animals entered for competition in the Youth Shows, see special rules.
2. **JOINT OWNERSHIP:** Jointly owned animals must be entered and shown under the multi-ownership (all co-owners) in the individual classes. In the Group classes, jointly-owned animals may be entered and exhibited under the name of one of the co-owners provided the individual owns a full or part interest in each of the animals in the group entry.
3. **A YOUTH EXHIBITOR** is defined as a boy or girl regularly enrolled as a 4-H or FFA member and who is in the third grade or nine years old, but not more than 19 years old as of Sept. 1, 2009. They **MUST** also be enrolled in public or private elementary or secondary schools and **MUST** have continuously personally fed, fitted and cared for their entry under the direct supervision of an agriculture science teacher or AgriLife Extension agent. See individual departments and divisions for any exceptions.
4. **BARRED EXHIBITORS:** The Tri-State Fair and Rodeo, in cooperation with member shows of the North American Livestock Show and Rodeo Manager's Association and the Database, reserves the right to refuse entry of any exhibitor who has been barred from any other show on the basis of unethical practices.

5. **REGISTRATION AND CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY REGISTRATION:** Exhibitors must have their original registration and certificates of veterinary inspection available with their exhibits at all times during the show. Any animal that cannot meet the requirements as to pedigree and registration will be barred from competition.
6. **EQUIPMENT:** Any equipment brought in to be used in assigned stalls or spaces must comply with and be used in compliance with federal, state and municipal occupational safety and health regulations. **FANS: NO REAR FANS WILL BE PERMITTED. SIDE OR FRONT FANS MUST BE MOUNTED AND SECURED.**
7. **STALLS/PENS/TIE-OUTS:** No entries will be accepted nor pens or stalls reserved unless the correct entry fees accompany the applications. All animals will be pre-stalled. **THE TRI-STATE FAIR AND RODEO RESERVES THE RIGHT TO LIMIT ENTRIES BASED ON AVAILABLE SPACE IN A MANNER IT DEEMS APPROPRIATE.**
8. **FEED/BEDDING:** The Tri-State Fair will not sell feed or hay. Exhibitors may bring their own or purchase locally. Please be careful on the amount of hay left at the tie-outs. Shavings may be purchased from the fair for \$8 per bag. **SHAVINGS** only will be used as bedding in all livestock and equine buildings.
9. **CLASSES:** The Exposition reserves the right to cancel or combine any livestock classes listed in the premium list.
10. **GROOMING CHUTES:** Will be allowed in the livestock barn, but must be stationed in the stall and not in any aisles. **USE OF GROOMING CHUTES WILL NOT BE PERMITTED IN AISLES AT ANY TIME DURING THE SHOW.**
11. **CODE OF ETHICS:** The showing of unethically fitted livestock or livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered is prohibited. The Tri-State Fair and Rodeo expect exhibitors to maintain the highest standards of husbandry and fair competition, and the Fair reserves the right to determine that practices unspecified in this rule may constitute unethical fitting. In addition to Tri-State Fair and Rodeo rules, all exhibitors are subject to the guidelines and consequences of the IAFE (International Association of Fair and Expositions) National Code of Show Ring Ethics, as it may be amended and published from time to time. Without limitation, however, unethical fitting shall include any violation of the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo Foreign Substance Prevention Program.

Further, unethical fitting shall be deemed to include any physical or physiological attempt to alter the natural confirmation, musculature or weight of an animal by use of injections, operations, "airing" or any ingested material not conducive to the continued health of the animal or marketability of its carcass.

Further, unethical fitting shall include any attempt to change the major color pattern of an animal by painting or dyeing to change color, or use of any grooming material such as twine or hair that changes or extracts color of an animal. By entering an animal in the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo, every exhibitor is deemed to have consented to inspection of the animal by any veterinarians or other officials to which the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo has delegated the power to inspect animals and is deemed to have agreed to have such animals submitted to any tests as may be designated and requested by Tri-State Fair and Rodeo or any of its delegates. Refusal by an exhibitor to submit an animal to examination or testing shall automatically be grounds for disqualification.

Further, by entering the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo, each exhibitor has agreed to the determination of the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo or its delegates as to whether such animal is unethically fitted or over age shall be final. To the extent factual disputes may arise regarding any issue of unethical fitting, the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo and any of its officials may resolve and determine such factual disputes utilizing whatever procedures the Fair may establish from time to time at its complete discretion. Participation in the exhibition of show animals at the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo is a privilege extended to qualified exhibitors, not a property right. By entering the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo, the exhibitor agrees that the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo may exchange information about any unethical fitting by an exhibitor with other shows; and further, may disclose, communicate or publish such information to officials of other exhibitions, to the International Association of Fairs and Expositions and American Livestock Show and Rodeo Manager's Association rule infraction data bases, to sponsoring county organizations or schools, to law enforcement officials and the press. The Tri-State Fair and Rodeo reserves the right to adopt, at its discretion and on a case-by-case basis if it so desires, appropriate sanctions for violation of these rules. At a minimum, any animal determined to be the subject of unethical fitting will be disqualified and declared ineligible to receive awards, premium money or sales proceeds. Further, the Fair

may declare the exhibitor ineligible for further participation in the current Tri-State Fair and Rodeo in which he or she is entered with other animals and in any or all future Tri-State Fair and Rodeos. In addition, the Fair may declare the same or greater ineligibility for members of the exhibitor's immediate family. Further, if the Fair has reasonable cause to believe that such violation was sanctioned, approved or aided by a sponsor, the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo may declare the sponsor ineligible for future participation. If an entry is disqualified under this rule, no changes will be made in the placing of other animals.

12. **COLOR: No change of the natural color pattern of the animal by painting or dyeing will be allowed.** Any grooming material that allows color to come off from any animal will not be allowed at the show.
13. **Unethically Fitted Livestock: Cattle Only: Judges shall not award a prize to an unworthy exhibit. It is the intention of the Management that no premium or distinction of any kind shall be given any animal that is not deserving. Unethically fitted animals will be barred from exhibition. Animals that have been given any form of intoxicating beverage, tranquilizer or other drug affecting mood or attitude prior to judging will be disqualified. Any product administered internally or used externally to alter the appearance or conformation of an animal for exhibition is prohibited and will be cause for disqualification. This includes but not limited to stomach pumping. The use of graphite, powders, dyes, hemp, false-tail heads, glued on hair or hair-like substances, or other similar substances externally, and steroids or growth stimulants are prohibited. Judges are also requested to report to the Fair management any animals upon which a surgical operation has been performed to improve their "show" appearance. If after examination by an official veterinarian, an animal is found to be in violation of any of the above: (a) it will be barred from further exhibition; (b) no awards will be made; and (c) stall and entry fees will not be refunded. The decision of the official veterinarian will be final. These rules will be strictly adhered to whether there is competition or not.**
14. **PHOTOGRAPHS:** Photographs of Grand Champion and Reserve livestock will be taken by the official photographer of the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo.
15. **SUBSTITUTIONS: Substitutions will be permitted until noon the day preceding judging. A substitute showman in**

the youth show must be a 4-H or FFA member with an animal entered in that division and from the same chapter or county. ALL 4-H and FFA members are considered to be eligible by the Amarillo Tri-State Exposition to participate in the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo youth shows at the time entries are received from the agricultural science teachers or AgriLife Extension agents. Any teacher or agent who has a member in his/her 4-H/FFA program who becomes ineligible to participate in the Fair according to House Bill 72 or TAAS conflict must provide written and signed notification to the Tri-State Fair office at least (24) hours prior to the commencement of any competitive phase of the Fair. This includes but is not limited to the following: Livestock Exhibition, Weighing, Sifting, Classifying of Animals, Judging Contest Participants, Agricultural Mechanics Contest, Garden and Agronomy Exhibitions.

Absolute Disqualifications

- Coarse, chalky, white hair on the face, down the back of the hind legs and in the flanks.
- Black or brown freckles above the hooves in the hairline.

- Steep hip or tendency to show the callipyge gene.

FINE WOOL CROSS

Acceptable Breed Characteristics

Must be a cross with evidence of a least 50% fine wool breeding and the other percentage should be predominantly Hampshire and/or Suffolk characteristics.

Soft pelt that is characteristic of half-blood wool (60's, 62's spinning count).

Mottling and/or some spotting on face and ears.

Mottling and/or some spotting of legs below the knees and stifle joint.

Face and ears should be soft and silky.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics

Face, ears and legs should not be extremely dark or solid in color.

Colored fiber (black or brown spots) in the wool.

Absence of wool on the legs below the knees and/or hocks.

Absolute Disqualifications

Coarse, chalky, white hair on the face, ears, legs or flanks.

Harsh, coarse pelt.

Black lambs.

Surgical alterations other than redocking.

Steep hip or tendency to show callipyge gene.

SOUTHDOWN

Acceptable Breed Characteristics

Hair color on muzzle and nose should be mouse colored, gray to brown.

Pigmentation of nostril may be black to purplish-gray.

Ears should be moderate length, covered with short hair or wool.

Hoof color should be black.
