SPECIAL RULES:

1. All entries and awards in this division shall be subject to the General Rules and Regulations of the Tri-State Fair.
2. Articles entered for exhibition must be the work of students enrolled (at the time of construction) in agri-science classes in high schools that are approved by TEA, or they may be a 4-H project that is constructed under the supervision of their AgriLife Extension agent. Organizations that are eligible to compete include schools in Area 1 for FFA and 4-H clubs in District 1 & 2.
3. Entries may be individually or chapter constructed.
4. An article may be shown only once at the Tri-State Fair, and must have been constructed during the 2008-2009 school term or the beginning of the 2009-2010 term.
5. All articles must be clean and in a presentable condition.
6. Photos showing operation of the project may be displayed with the exhibit.
7. It will be the responsibility of the exhibitor to place signs on each exhibit showing (1) Student's name; (2) FFA Chapter or 4-H Club; (3) Name of item; (4) The bill of materials (realistic cost) and value of materials; (5) Photos of construction; (6) Student-drawn plans (CAD plans are acceptable). Outside exhibit signs must be waterproof.
8. The following factors will be considered in judging the exhibits (1) Workmanship; (2) Accuracy; (3) Skills Displayed; (4) Practicability; (5) Safety; (6) Design; (7) Finish; (8) Knowledge.
9. Student or students must be present during the judging in order to answer the judge's questions.
10. Judges will use the following point system to place projects:

- a. Workmanship 25 points
 - b. Design and Materials Used 10 points
 - c. Practically 10 points
 - d. Degree of Difficulty 10 points
 - e. Finish 10 points
 - f. Plans, Bill of Materials, Photographs 10 points
 - g. Students Knowledge of Project 25 points
 - Total of points 100 points
11. Sweepstake awards will be made on the basis of total points accumulated in the various classes. Points awarded for each class is as follows; 1st-20, 2nd-16, 3rd-12, 4th-8, 5th-6, 6th-5, 7th-4, 8th-3, 9th-2 and 10th-1.
 12. Exhibits in the class 'Small Projects' must measure less than 300 cubic feet. If an exhibit is entered in the wrong class, the Superintendent will make the determination and transfer it to the proper class.
 13. The judge will not award premiums or points for entries that do not meet acceptable standards of quality.
 14. All exhibits must be displayed in a safe manner.
 15. Only exhibitors present at the time of judging will be eligible for awards.
 16. There will be no more than six exhibitors/students allowed to show per project.

2. All fruit and vegetable exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor.
3. Perishable fruits and vegetables are not returnable and will be disposed of as they spoil - other exhibits must be redeemed between 1-3 p.m. Sun., Sept. 27. Premiums will be given to eligible exhibitors on Sun., Sept. 27. **Exhibits not picked up by this time will be disposed of.**
4. In cases where there is only one exhibitor and no competition, the judge shall only award premiums in accordance with the merits of the exhibit, which may be first, second, third, etc.
5. All cotton bolls must be naturally opened in the field.
6. **No chemically- treated seed will be accepted.**
7. Samples which do not meet class specifications as listed (such as size, quantity, number, etc.) will not be accepted.

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Special Rules:

1. Divisions: The contest will be divided into two divisions.
 - A. Division 1, Junior division. Contestants must be at least 8 years old by Jan. 1, 2009 and in third grade. Contestants may be no more than 13 years old by Jan. 1, 2009.
 - B. Division 2, Senior division. Contestants between 14 and 19 years old on Jan. 1, 2009.
2. Qualifications: Any agricultural science teacher, AgriLife Extension agent or 4-H leader may enter as many teams as they wish in each division. Participants must have passed their 8th but not their 19th birthday before Jan. 1, 2009 and must be enrolled in a public or private elementary or secondary school in Texas, New Mexico or Oklahoma to participate.
3. Teams: Competing teams will consist of 3 or 4 members. Scores of the 3 highest scoring team members will comprise a team score. Individual contestants may compete and contend for all individual awards.
4. Entry: Teams may enter in this contest by sending a completed entry form (available from the Tri-State Fair office) along with applicable fees to: Tri-State Fair, 3301 E. 10th Ave., Amarillo, TX 79104. There will be a \$20-per-team fee to enter this contest. Contestants may be entered individually for \$5. Complimentary one-day passes will be issued to the competing team members and one coach per team. Fees include an award's luncheon for team members and coaches. All those wishing to attend the award's luncheon should indicate such on the entry form.
5. Plant selection: Plants will be selected from the Master Plant list prepared by the Texas AgriLife Extension Service, the Department of Vocational Agriculture, the Natural Resources Conservation Service, the Association of Soil and Water

Conservation Districts and Show officials. Copies of this plant list may be secured by writing the AgriLife Extension Range Specialist, Room 225 AI Building, Texas A&M University, College Station, TX 77845-2126. Primary emphasis will be placed upon plants that grow in the Texas Panhandle area.

6. Plant Specimens: Plants may be mounted or live specimens.
7. Scoring: Contestants will be given scorecards. Contestants will have 60 seconds per plant to identify the plant, write in the common name on the scorecard and check the characteristics. Scoring will be done by points. If the plant name is incorrect, no credit will be given for characteristics correctly identified. Tie scores will be broken by providing contestants an opportunity to identify another set of plants. Judges' decisions will be final.

Awards

High scoring individuals in each division will receive a trophy & money. Awards will also be given to the Reserve high scoring individuals. Third, fourth and fifth place individuals in each contest will receive appropriate awards.

Top five teams in each division will receive banners. Other appropriate team awards will be provided also.
